Serving in Albania

This year it was the Missions 2 team's privilege to go to the country of Albania. It was in this country that we would have our lives and perspectives changed. We spent our first week in a mid-sized town called Burrel. There we worked with Operation Mobilization, who work to teach people how to spread the gospel. The last three days of our trip were spent in Albania's capital, Tirana.



In Burrel we worked with a church that was established about 15 years ago. Because our focus in Albania was on the youth, we spent a lot of time playing football (soccer) and inviting students to church afterwards. We also spent a few mornings of the week simply handing out invitations (for church programs and soccer) and talking with young people at the entrance and courtyards of the high schools. The talks with the youth helped us understand how they live and what some of them have gone through.



During some mornings a few team members went to an English class held in the town and talked to the students. While they were doing this, the remaining members of the team went on house visits. It was amazing to see the trust the people had in God. This was seen very clearly through their testimonies.

After a church service and amazing worship time at the church in Burrel we moved on to Tirana. In Tirana we worked with Campus Crusade with a goal of reaching out to high school students. We held two programs on the Monday and Tuesday afternoons specifically for them. We spent our mornings handing out invitations to students inviting them to our events in the afternoons. During both these events and during our programs the previous week, we shared testimonies, sang songs in both languages, and did skits.



All in all the trip was an impacting experience that we pray we will never forget. Please keep the two organizations as well as the Albanians in your prayers.
